


# 'Ka Pai Kid's Club'

## Mosston School Behaviour Management System

We have a positive behaviour management programme at Mosston school.

This is made up of two parts. The Ka Pai Kids club and the Traffic Light System.

This enables us to both reward and reinforce children's self management of their behaviour and apply an appropriate consequence when needed.

Ka Pai Kids club	Consequences / Traffic Lights
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• There is a <b>Ka Pai Kids celebration</b> twice a term.</li> <li>• Students who are making good choices in the class or playground are given a "jump up" on their class visual e.g. Flower, rocket ship etc</li> <li>• Each class has a visual display for Jump ups and displays the characteristics of a Ka Pai Kid.</li> <li>• The characteristics of a Ka Pai kid are based around our Mosston CARES.</li> <li>• To attend the Ka Pai Kids club each child needs to earn a total of <b>5</b> jump ups.</li> <li>• Parents will receive a notification that their child has earned a "ticket" with the information about the celebration planned.</li> <li>• Students have until the day before the celebration to earn their 5 jumps.</li> <li>• Parents of students who are not attending will be notified the day before.</li> </ul> <div data-bbox="127 1030 782 1456" style="border: 2px solid blue; border-radius: 50%; padding: 20px; text-align: center;"> <p><b>A KA PAI KID ...</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Completes 'Must Do' activities to a quality standard</li> <li>• Consistently demonstrates the CARES values</li> <li>• Can follow instructions</li> <li>• Contributes to our Mosston community</li> <li>• Completes homework &amp; home reading regularly</li> </ul>  </div>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A warning is always given first and then, if the behaviour persists a traffic light will be given.</li> <li>• A traffic light note will then be sent home to parents so that you remain informed. This will need to be signed and returned to school.</li> <li>• Any child who receives a <b>yellow</b> traffic light will have an in school consequence.</li> <li>• Traffic lights given are recorded on our School Management System under the child's name..</li> <li>• This may be a loss of playtime on the red bench, a letter of apology or loss of play privileges e.g. unable to play on the field for a few days. Teachers make a decision on the appropriate form of consequence to suit the behaviour. The consequence seeks to restore and focus on what needs to be done to make it right.</li> <li>• If a student receives three yellow traffic lights in a term, we will then have a discussion with parents about the behaviours and how we can work together to support your child to make good choices.</li> <li>• All students begin each day back on "green" starting fresh.</li> </ul> <p>Behaviours that merit a traffic light are outlined below.</p>

### The traffic light system is tiered.

**Warning** - child is asked to modify their negative behaviours and their name is placed on the board. Negative behaviour could include; off task - not doing what they should be, loud or unsafe actions e.g. running in class, not managing themselves or their belongings

The warning helps bring attention to what they are doing and helps redirect the student back on course.

**Yellow** - If the child continues with negative behaviour or starts another inappropriate behaviour they will be given a yellow traffic light. Yellow is also used for disrespect to other students e.g. name calling, or to staff or for a refusal to comply. It can also be used for not following class rules or school boundaries.

**Orange** - Child moves up to orange if they continue to choose to engage in negative behaviours, or their behaviour has affected the safety or ability to learn of other students. This includes bullying, which by definition is repeated targeting of a child.

**Red** - A red is a serious offence and is very rarely given. It is used for students who are highly disruptive and can't be redirected back to task, or when there has been an incident that has affected the safety or wellbeing of other students e.g. fighting, stealing, verbal abuse etc. If your child has a red traffic light there will be a parent meeting with the principal to discuss the incident and a plan made of how to avoid this happening again.

There are certain classroom and playground behaviours which may result in a child going directly to yellow, orange or red without a warning. This is at the teacher's discretion.
