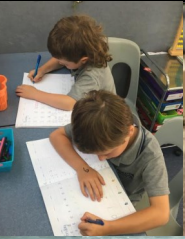

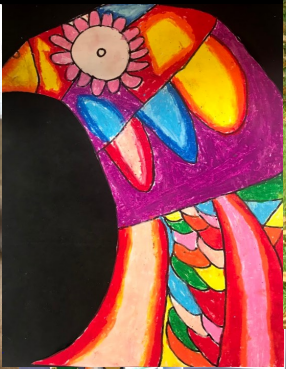

Today, we remember those who have fallen on Anzac Day and we attend a dawn service. We also remember them by wearing a poppy.

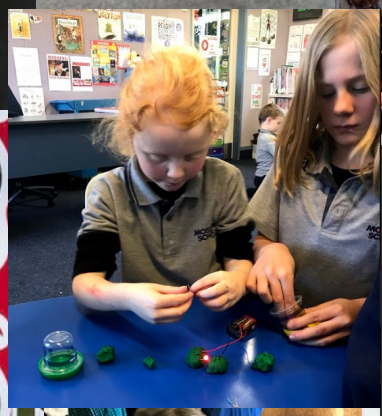

 The wives of soldiers made ANZAC biscuits to send away with the soldiers. They lasted the journey because they didn't have eggs or milk in the recipe.

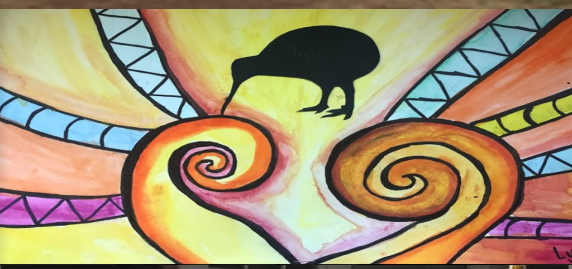
